9. Compare and Contrast

 This directive requires you to bring out the similarities and differences between two or more subjects. You should present a comparative analysis rather than simply listing similarities or differences.

10. Justify

 You are required to provide strong arguments or reasons to support a particular stance or viewpoint. The answer should be convincing, and evidence-based.

11. Differentiate

 You are required to highlight the distinctions between two or more concepts, ideas, or phenomena.

12. Enumerate

• This directive asks for a listing of facts or aspects. You are expected to provide a simple and concise list without much elaboration.

13. Outline

• Here, you are expected to give a brief description or summary, touching upon the main points without going into detail.

14. Summarize

• This directive requires you to condense the information, focusing on the essential points and leaving out any unnecessary details.
