


Context


It opens the door to enhanced international technical & financial assistance mechanisms to guarantee protection of property & to help facilitate its rehabilitation.


3. Mandakini River - The Hindu

- **About:** A tributary of the Alaknanda River in Uttarakhand.
- **Length:** The river runs for approximately 81 kilometers between the Rudraprayag and Sonprayag areas

Drainage Basin:

- Origin: Chorabari Glacier.
- **Confluence:** It merges with river Songanga at Sonprayag and flows past the Madhyamaheshwar temple at Ukhimath.
- **Mouth:** At the end of its course it drains into the Alaknanda, which flows into the Ganges.









5. On reservations and the OBC creamy layer - The Hindu

Context

The allotment of Indian Administrative Service (IAS) to Puja Khedkar as an Other Backward Class (OBC) Non-Creamy Layer (NCL) candidate coupled with multiple disabilities has raised issues surrounding the creamy layer in OBC reservation.

History of reservation

- **Articles 15 and 16:** They guarantee equality to all citizens in any policy of the government and public employment respectively.
- **Current quota:** Reservations for SC and ST are fixed at 15% and 7.5% respectively, in jobs, educational institutions and PSUs at the central level.
- **OBC quota:** It was in 1990, when V. P. Singh was Prime Minister, that 27% reservation for OBC was implemented in central government employment based on Mandal Commission (1980) recommendations.
- **EWS quota:** In 2019, 10% reservation was enabled for the Economically Weaker Sections (EWS) among the unreserved category.
- Identifying a person as part of the OBC creamy layer: Based on the recommendations of the Justice Ram Nandan Prasad Committee (1993).

Criteria

- Parental income, excluding income from salary and agricultural income, being more than ₹8 lakh in each year in the last three consecutive financial years.
- Other categories of applicants are also considered as belonging to creamy layer:
 - parents, either of whom entered government service (centre or State) as Group A/Class I officer or parents, both of whom entered as Group B/Class II officers or father, who was recruited in Group B/Class II post and promoted to Group A/Class I before 40 years of age;
 - either of the parents employed in a managerial position in PSUs; (c)
 either of the parents holding constitutional posts.

Issues

- Inadequacies in the process: There are allegations that some applicants manage to obtain NCL or EWS certificate through dubious means.
- **Issues with respect to disability certificates:** To take benefit of the 4% of seats reserved for persons with disabilities in central government jobs.
- Allegations of applicants & their parents adopting strategies to get around the creamy layer exclusion: Gifting of assets, taking premature retirement etc., since the applicant's or his/her spouse's income is not considered for such exclusion.
- Concentration of reservation benefits: Rohini Commission set up for providing recommendation on sub-categorisation among OBC castes, has



estimated that 97% of reserved jobs & seats in educational institutions have been garnered by just around 25% of the OBC castes/sub-castes at the central level.

Way forward

- Plugging the loopholes in the issue of NCL, EWS and disability certificates: There must be thorough scrutiny to ensure that only eligible applicants obtain these benefits.
- Vacancies for reserved communities to be filled without backlogs: Sub-categorisation of reservation may be essential to address the under representation or non-representation of various communities.
- Creamy layer exclusion in SC and ST category, at least for children of Group I/Class A government officials: These are sensitive matters in which for every argument in favour of such a proposal, there are valid counter arguments that can be advanced.
- A discussion on these aspects with all stakeholders to implement them: This would ensure that benefits of reservation reach the more marginalised among underprivileged in successive generations.

8. Nicobar port plan: Flagged in no-go zone earlier, now in permitted area - Indian Express


Context

A high-powered committee (HPC), appointed by the NGT and tasked with

revisiting the green clearance for the Great Nicobar infrastructure project, has concluded that a proposed transshipment port does not fall in the Island Coastal Regulation Zone-IA (ICRZ-IA), where ports are prohibited, but is in ICRZ-IB where these are permitted.

Great Nicobar Island Project

- About: A mega project to be implemented at the southern end of the Andaman and Nicobar islands.
- Components: International container transshipment terminal, a greenfield international airport, township development, and a 450 MVA gas and solar based power plant over an extent of 16,610 hectares in the island.




9. LTCG taxation: Withdrawal of indexation benefit, and the slugfest over it - Indian Express

Context



The changes in the long-term capital gains (LTCG) tax regime, particularly the withdrawal of the indexation benefit, has emerged as one of the most contentious decisions announced in the Union Budget for 2024-25. The announcement initially led to confusion and trepidation among various sections, prompting the government to issue a string of clarifications and explanations, claiming that it will be beneficial in most cases.

- Types: Short-term Capital Gains and Long-term Capital Gains.

Private sector owns over 52% of the total installed power generation capacity of 446GW in the country, playing an important role in the sector, Parliament was recently informed



11. Central body urges southern States to intensify energy efficiency efforts - The Hindu

Context

The Bureau of Energy Efficiency (BEE) urged the State Designated Agencies (SDAs) of all southern States, particularly the proactive ones like Andhra Pradesh (A.P.), to intensify their focus on energy efficiency and Mission LiFE in order to realise the immense potential for attracting global investments in key sectors such as industry, urban development, agriculture and building.

Bureau of Energy Efficiency (BEE)

- **Establishment:** 2002 under the provisions of the Energy Conservation Act, 2001.
- **Objective:** To reduce energy intensity in the Indian economy.
- Functions:
 - Develop minimum energy performance standards for equipment and appliances under Standards and Labelling
 - Develop minimum energy performance standards for Commercial Buildings
 - Develop Energy Consumption Norms for Designated Consumers
- Nodal Ministry: Ministry of Power

Bureau of Energy Efficiency



Energy Conservation (EC) Act 2001

- Standard & Labeling




12. CITES eases norms for agarwood export; move to benefit lakhs of farmers from the Northeast - The Hindu

Context

India has successfully prevented inclusion of Aquilaria malaccensis (agarwood) in the Review of Significant Trade (RST) of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES). The CITES also notified a new export quota of highly valuable and aromatic resinous wood and oil of Aquilaria malaccensis (agarwood) from India from April 2024.

Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES)



Aquilaria malaccensis (agarwood)

- **About:** A large evergreen tree about 20 meters tall and 1.5–2.4 meters in girth with somewhat straight and fluted bole.
- Use: Used as fragrant and in prepation of drugs.
- Floral Characteristics: Flowers are white in colour, bisexual.
- Distribution: Bengal and North-Eastern States of India namely Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur, Mizoram, Arunachal Pradesh and Nagaland.
- **Climate:** A tropical tree which grows over high rainfall tract throughout humid regions.
- Soil: It grows over sandy loam and slightly acidic soils.

13. Surprising 'dark oxygen' discovery could ensnarl deep-sea mining - The Hindu

Context

An unknown process is producing oxygen deep in the world's oceans, where it is too dark for photosynthesis, scientists reported on July 22 in the journal Nature



Geoscience. The finding has important implications because oxygen helps support life and the discovery implies the existence of previously unknown ecosystems.

Dark Oxygen

- **About:** Oxygen being produced in complete darkness thousands of feet below the ocean surface is termed dark oxygen.
- **Production:** The oxygen comes out of Polymetallic nodules (PMN) made up of metals like manganese, iron, cobalt, nickel, copper, and lithium which can generate oxygen through electrochemical activity without light.
- Mechanism: PMN H2O molecules into hydrogen and oxygen.

14. Bannerughatta Biological Park - The Hindu

- Location: Near Bangalore, Karnataka, in the hills of the Anekal range.
- **Designation:** It was declared as a National Park in 1974.
- **Significance:** In 2002 a portion of the park became a biological reserve, the Bannerghatta Biological Park. It is the first biological park in India to have a fenced forested elephant sanctuary.
- Butterfly reserve: In 2006, India's first butterfly enclosure was inaugurated at the park.
- River: Suvarnamukhi stream, the main source of water for the animals of the park, runs through the centre of the park.



- **Vegetation:** Dry Deciduous Scrub Forests, Southern Tropical Dry Deciduous Forests and Southern Tropical Moist Mixed Forests.
- Flora: Narcissus latifolia, Schleichera oleosa, Sandalwood, Neem, Tamarind, Bamboo, Eucalyptus etc.
- Fauna: Asian Elephant, Indian gaur, Tiger, Sambar deer, Spotted deer, Leopard, Wild dog, Wild pig, Sloth bear, Common mongoose, Pangolin, Slender loris, Black-naped hare, etc.

15. Ariel - The Hindu

- **Discovery:** Oct. 24, 1851 by William Lassell, one of 19th century England's astronomers.
- **Materials:** A Uranus' moon consisting mostly of roughly equal amounts of water ice and silicate rock. Carbon dioxide has also been detected on Ariel.
- **Features:** It has few large craters and many small ones, indicating that fairly recent low-impact collisions wiped out the large craters that would have been left by much earlier, bigger strikes.

Context

Several friends and family members of mine received a call from a North American (+1) phone number which played a pre-recorded message informing them of a supposed court summons.

Caller ID spoofing

• **About:** A technique with which the phone number that a call appears to originate from can be falsified.

Usage:

- Malicious individuals use caller ID spoofing primarily to shield their identity when engaging in illicit activity.
- It is used by these individuals to carry out social engineering attacks, where the spoofed caller ID is abused for the implicit trust that the receiving party associates with it.
- It can also be used to circumvent standard call blocking systems, and even for exploiting vulnerabilities in insecure Interactive Voice Response (IVR) systems.






E-Upahaar Portal

- **Design and development:** National Informatics Centre (NIC), Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology.
- Aim: To increase citizen engagement & to support noble causes.

1. Haribhau Kisanrao Bagde becomes the new Governor of Rajasthan

- Haribhau Kisanrao Bagde has been appointed as the new Governor of Rajasthan (45th Governor).
- He has been the Speaker of the Maharashtra Legislative Assembly from 2014 to 2019.
- He has also been the Minister of Food and Civil Supplies, Horticulture Minister in Maharashtra.
- Bagde is from Aurangabad district of Maharashtra.
- He was elected MLA for the first time in 1985.
- Mr. Gulab Chand Kataria of Rajasthan (earlier Governor of Assam) has also been appointed as the Governor of Punjab and Administrator of Chandigarh.
- BJP leader of Rajasthan Om Prakash Mathur has been appointed as the Governor of Sikkim.

2. National Conference on Traditional Water Conservation Techniques

- A three-day National Conference on Traditional Water Conservation Techniques was organized in Jaipur from 27 to 29 July 2024.
- It was organized in collaboration with the Ministry of Jal Shakti, Government of India.
- It was agreed in the conference to include a chapter on water conservation in primary education.
- Under this, traditional methods of water conservation like Bawdi, Kuan, Johar and Nadi etc. will be renovated to improve the groundwater level.
- Emphasis was laid on public cooperation along with the government and administration to adopt traditional methods of water conservation.

3. 'Operation Seema'

- It is an initiative of Sri Ganganagar District Administration and District Police.
- Its objective is to prevent the increasing trend of drug addiction in the district and make the district drug free.
- Under this, the Education Department organized a workshop in the higher secondary schools of the district to spread awareness among the children.
